The Collect of the Day

Celebrant	The Lord be with you.
People	And also with you.
Celebrant	Let us pray.

Transcendent God, you took on human form, and with it human sexuality and gender, entering into our broken world, bearing our suffering along with us. We remember that on this weekend, fifty-six years ago, a riot broke out as a response to years of victimization and oppression. We lift up those lives and their voices, remembering their hardships and their courage. We ask you to send your Spirit to us that we may give voice to those without one, and work together to end the oppression of your children who are hurt by discrimination based upon their sexual orientation or gender identity. Help us to remove every barrier to the life abundant which you desire for all your children; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen*.

The First Reading

1 Kings 19:15-16,19-21

The Lord said to Elijah, "Go, return on your way to the wilderness of Damascus; when you arrive, you shall anoint Hazael as king over Aram. Also you shall anoint Jehu son of Nimshi as king over Israel; and you shall anoint Elisha son of Shaphat of Abel-meholah as prophet in your place."

So he set out from there, and found Elisha son of Shaphat, who was plowing. There were twelve yoke of oxen ahead of him, and he was with the twelfth. Elijah passed by him and threw his mantle over him. He left the oxen, ran after Elijah, and said, "Let me kiss my father and my mother, and then I will follow you." Then Elijah said to him, "Go back again; for what have I done to you?" He returned from following him, took the yoke of oxen, and slaughtered them; using the equipment from the oxen, he boiled their flesh, and gave it to the people, and they ate. Then he set out and followed Elijah, and became his servant.

The Second Reading

Galatians 5:1,13-25

For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery. For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another. For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." If, however, you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another.

Live by the Spirit, I say, and do not gratify the desires of the flesh. For what the flesh desires is opposed to the Spirit, and what the Spirit desires is opposed to the flesh; for these are opposed to each other, to prevent you from doing what you want. But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not subject to the law. Now the works of the flesh are obvious: fornication, impurity, licentiousness, idolatry, sorcery, enmities, strife, jealousy, anger, quarrels, dissensions, factions, envy, drunkenness, carousing, and things like these. I am warning you, as I warned you before: those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God.

By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things. And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit.

The Gospel

DeaconThe Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.PeopleGlory to you, Lord Christ.

When the days drew near for Jesus to be taken up, he set his face to go to Jerusalem. And he sent messengers ahead of him. On their way they entered a village of the Samaritans to make ready for him; but they did not receive him, because his face was set toward Jerusalem. When his disciples James and John saw it, they said, "Lord, do you want us to command fire to come down from heaven and consume them?" But he turned and rebuked them. Then they went on to another village.

As they were going along the road, someone said to him, "I will follow you wherever you go." And Jesus said to him, "Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests; but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head." To another he said, "Follow me." But he said, "Lord, first let me go and bury my father." But Jesus said to him, "Let the dead bury their own dead; but as for you, go and proclaim the kingdom of God." Another said, "I will follow you, Lord; but let me first say farewell to those at my home." Jesus said to him, "No one who puts a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God."

O God, life-giving Spirit, Spirit of healing and comfort, of integrity and truth, we believe and trust in you. Warm-winged Spirit, brooding over creation, rushing wind and Pentecostal fire, we commit ourselves to work with you and renew our world. Amen.

The Prayers of the People

Leader People	Holy One, we believe that your love, working through us, will find a way to heal our wounded world, and that suffering and poverty will end; for we believe in your persistent love. Help us be your love in the world. Send us to those who suffer.
Leader	We believe that you have made us who we are, in your image, a beautiful community of diverse races, cultures, sexual identities, and gender expressions. You declared us "very good." We celebrate this diversity, for we believe in your creative imagination.
People	Help us make to our world safe for all to live with integrity, for barriers to tumble down, and for all to live in peace. Send us out to change the world.
Leader	We believe we are all members of one Body. We share a heart with those who suffer violence, who live in fear, who are cast out because of their sexuality or any other reason. We ache with them, for we believe that you love without exception.
People	Help us reach out in love. Send us into the world proclaiming your Good News.
Leader	We believe that we are not yet perfected. We fear. We judge. We cause harm by our action and our inaction. But we still turn to you for help, for we believe in your forgiveness.
People	Help us to receive your forgiveness. Send us into the world to forgive.
Leader	We believe that the liberation of those in captivity did not end with Moses leading the Hebrew slaves out of Egypt, or with Jesus' death and resurrection, but that even now you are pulling humanity out of darkness into the light; for we believe in your kingdom come on earth.
People	Give us courage and strength. Send us into the world to lead.
Leader	We believe it is not too late for those filled with hate to learn to live in love, for we believe in your heart-transforming power.
People	Help us love even those who hate. Send us out with love for all.

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Leader	We believe that our prayers do matter, and so we offer them now for ourselves, for those we love, and for the world we share. (<i>The people offer</i> <i>their own intercessions, silently or aloud</i>).
Leader	We believe in gratitude. We offer thanks to those brave souls who have risked much for others. We offer thanks for all the moments of grace that sustain us. (<i>The people offer their own thanksgivings, silently or aloud.</i>)

The Officiant adds a concluding Collect

Gracious and loving God, you made your gift of creation diverse beyond all measure, and in the sign of the rainbow you sealed your covenant with us. Send your Spirit upon us at this time of Pride, assuring us always of your eternal love and guidance, as we continue Jesus' work of inclusion and equality. Bless those who suffer the pain of bigotry and hatred, unite us in your truth and peace, and comfort us as we remember our loved ones who have gone before us. All this we ask in your Name, O holy and undivided Trinity, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Confession of Sin (the people may kneel)

Deacon Let us humbly confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

Celebrant and people

God of all mercy, we confess that we have sinned against you, opposing your will in our lives. We have denied your goodness in each other, in ourselves, and in the world you have created. We repent of the evil that enslaves us, the evil we have done, and the evil done on our behalf. Forgive, restore, and strengthen us through our Savior Jesus Christ, that we may abide in your love and serve only your will. Amen.

The Celebrant stands and says

Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive all your sins through the grace of Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. *Amen*.


The Great Thanksgiving

While Jesus lived among us he stood up for women and children, he touched the untouchable, healed the sick, and welcomed those who had given up hope of being included. Through him we see a path not only to our own freedom, but a path to the liberation of the whole world.

He taught us that it will not be in the brutality of violence that our world will be saved. Rather, it will be in showing kindness to our neighbor, in standing up against injustice, in returning hate with love, in transforming one heart at a time. It will be in the simple but holy task of eating together, sharing bread and wine, truly seeing one another as beloved by you. We know this because on the night before he was murdered, Jesus took bread, gave thanks to you, broke it, and gave it to his friends saying "Take, eat. This is my body broken for you. Do this to remember me."

After dinner he took the cup of wine, gave thanks, and gave it to them and said: "Drink this all of you. This is my blood of the new covenant, poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Do this to remember me."


Send your Holy Spirit, we pray, into these gifts of bread and wine, that they may become for us Christ's Body and Blood. Send your Holy Spirit into us also, that we may recognize each other as members of the same body, Christ's hands and feet and heart, sent for the healing of the world.



The Celebrant breaks the consecrated Bread. A period of silence follows, then all join in singing


